Here are all German-language publications known to me, or those printed in Germany, by McCormick • Deering • International Harvester • IHC • CASE IH, from 1908 to 1995. They have been compiled and condensed from five major collections, including the IHC archive at the Rhineland Agricultural Museum in Sinsteden, my own collection, and three additional collections from fellow IHC enthusiasts.

Listed by year of publication, the current status includes approximately 3,500 printed items of all kinds, excluding supplements. With supplements, the number increases to around 5,000 5,000 publications. Technical documents such as spare parts catalogs, operating manuals, workshop manuals, and cultivation or assembly instructions are only included if they have a publication number beginning with one of the following letters. "D", "P", "R", "GER".

Publications without a publication number—marked as "oNr"—which were clearly used for advertising and distributed to customers and/or dealers, are assigned to individual years where identifiable. for example:

For some publications, only the title pages are shown, for example when the content is too extensive (as with spare parts catalogs, workshop manuals, and operating manuals) or when no original is available. Exceptions include the initial letters "P", "R", "F", which were assigned in later years. though the reason is unknown.

In 1951, the initial letter "D" was changed to "GER" for Germany. Publications are assigned to specific years based on the year letter, although IHCs fiscal year differed from the calendar year, running from November to October.

As a result, publications spanning November and December were already marked with the letter of the following year. In addition to this numbering system, there are numerous inconsistencies; duplicate numbering, missing year letters, missing publication numbers, missing initial letters, incorrect year letters, number reversals etc.

In 1951, the initial letter "D" was changed to "GER" for basebarty cardboard—and formats—from DIN A6 to DIN A0, including American sizes—were used, depending on what in-house or external printers could process from November to October.

As a result, publications from November and December were already marked with the letter of the following year. In addition to this numbering system, there are numerous inconsistencies. duplicate numbering, missing year letters, missing publication numbers, missing initial letters, incorrect year letters, number reversals, etc.

A wide range of paper types—from thin parchment to heavy cardboard—and formats—from DIN A6 to DIN A0, including American sizes—were used, depending on what in-house or external printers could process.

The last publications bearing the "GER" designation date from 1995, before the print shop at the Neuss plant was closed and its work outsourced in preparation for the plant's shutdown.
